

The Good Samaritan

Luke 10:30-37



LOADED QUESTIONS

Wherever Jesus went, questions followed. Some were sincere, as in "Can you heal my child?" or "How will we feed all these people?" Others were loaded, meant to weaken Jesus' authority or find grounds for his crucifixion. Two men, a rich man and an "expert" in religious law, asked the same question two separate times: "Teacher, what must I do to receive eternal life?" (Matthew 19:16; Luke 10:25). One asked honestly; the other asked as a test.

LOADED ANSWERS

Jesus answered both men by the law and commandments, including in his answer, "Love your neighbor as yourself." The religious expert, however, wouldn't leave it at that. "The man wanted to justify his actions, so he asked Jesus, 'And who is my neighbor?' " (Luke 10:29). To the Jews, the word *neighbor* meant members of the Hebrew nation only—no outsiders. So when the expert asked, "And who is my neighbor?" he wasn't asking out of ignorance. He was hoping Jesus would confirm what the Jews believed.

A TELLING STORY

Instead, Jesus answered with a story about a Jewish man. While traveling a dangerous and desolate road, the man was attacked. Bandits stripped him of his clothes, took his money, and beat him until he was almost dead. They left the man, bruised and bleeding, to die on the side of the road. His hope of rescue was slim at best, but "by chance a priest came along." Ah, the hero! the expert likely thought. Imagine his surprise when Jesus said the priest avoided the man and passed him by. A Temple assistant also came upon the scene, but he only gawked for a moment and then passed by as well.

AN UNLIKELY HERO

"Then a despised Samaritan came along." Anyone listening to Jesus would know the history and hatred that clouded the Jewish-Samaritan relationship. Surely the Samaritan too would pass by. But Jesus revealed a plot twist: "When he saw the man, he felt deep pity." The Samaritan showed compassion, not only in how he felt about the man but also in his actions. He soothed the man's pain, bandaged his wounds, removed him from the roadside, and took him on his donkey to an inn. The Samaritan even paid extra to ensure care for the man would continue after he left. "Which of these three would you say was a neighbor?" Jesus asked. The answer was clear, but the expert in religious law couldn't bring himself to identify the Samaritan by name as the hero of the story. He simply replied, possibly through gritted teeth, "The one who showed him mercy."

LIVING INSIDE OUT

Jesus was intentional about casting the Samaritan as the hero. He wanted to show the Jewish people that "neighbor" surpasses borders. A neighbor can be anyone, without regard to nation, religion, or proximity. How does that definition of *neighbor* change the way you serve others? Do you serve those you know more easily than those you don't? Challenge yourself this week to look beyond borders and past prejudices to serve God's people in need.

INTRODUCE

Open your Bible to Luke 10:30-37. Say: Jesus often told stories to teach people things. When teaching people about being nice to neighbors, Jesus told a story about a Jewish man and a man from Samaria. Let's watch and see what happens to the Jewish man on the road to Jericho.



WATCH DVD

The Good Samaritan

Cue the DVD to the video The Good Samaritan.





DISCUSS IN GROUPS DVD The Good Samaritan Questions

Cue the question screen for kids to answer each of the following:

- · What do you think about how the three men treated the hurt
- Tell about a time someone helped you when you needed it.
- Tell which man you're most like when someone different from you needs help.



MAKE THE CONNECTION

Say: The Samaritan man and the Jewish man were enemies, but even that didn't stop the Samaritan man from helping. ► We serve everyone because God wants us to—even if they're different from us. If someone needs our help, we help them!

DVD Drama Lesson 4



Living Inside Out





YOU'LL NEED

TV or VPU • DVD player • Large-Group DVD • Inflatable Globe (provided in kit)

Neighbors



BEGIN

Have kids get into their small groups, and say: Let's talk! Discuss this question in your group: What makes someone a "neighbor"? Allow up to three minutes for kids to discuss.



SHOW

Hold up the Inflatable Globe and point on the globe to where you are now. Say: We live here. Is the person who lives here (point to a place close to where you live) our neighbor? Let the kids respond. Is the person who lives over here (point to another country on the globe) our neighbor? Let the kids respond. How can someone who lives far away still be our neighbor? Allow up to three minutes for kids to discuss.



TOSS

Toss the globe to a group, asking that group to choose a country and shout the name out so everyone can hear. Then have the group toss the globe to another group, and have that group pick a country and shout the name out. Continue until every group has said a country, or you have at least five countries.

Have the last group toss the globe back to you. Say: Let's use our brains! People in other countries are just like people right here they still need help sometimes. In your groups, pick one of the countries that were called out, and come up with three ways you can serve or help people in that country—right from where you are. Allow three minutes for kids to brainstorm. Then have groups pair up and share their ideas with each other.



DISCUSS IN GROUPS DVD



Neighbors Questions

Cue the question screen for kids to answer each of the following:

- · What do you think might be different about people in the country you chose from people in our country? What do you think might be the same?
- · When you see someone who needs help, how do you decide whether to help?
- · What's one thing you'll do to serve or help someone far away this week?



MAKE THE CONNECTION

Say: People near and far need help sometimes. It doesn't matter who they are or where they live. We have neighbors all over the globe, and we can find creative ways to bless God by serving and helping them. We serve everyone because God wants us to.

Game

YOU'LL NEED

TV or VPU • DVD player • Large-Group DVD • 1 large sheet of paper per small group • crayons • scissors

Give a Hand



GROUP

Have kids get into their small groups. Distribute sheets of paper, crayons, and scissors to each group.



EXPLAIN

Have kids work together to trace their hands on the paper with the crayons. After groups have finished tracing, say: Put your heads together and think of things you really need help with such as doing homework, cleaning your room, lifting something heavy, or reaching cookies on the top shelf. Write or draw those things on the palm of your traced hand. Allow two minutes.



When groups are finished, have them cut out their traced hands from the paper.



HAND

Once kids have their paper hands, have groups pair up. Say: **People** from each group, find someone in the other group and show your cutout hands—and what's drawn or written on them. Then think of ways you can help each other with the thing you need help with. When you've found a solution, write or draw it on the back side of your cutout hand. Ready? Let's give each other a hand! Allow three minutes. Then have kids return to their small groups.



DISCUSS in groups DVD Give a Hand Questions



Cue the guestion screen for kids to answer each of the following:

- · Share how your partner helped you with your problem.
- How can you use your real hands to help other people?
- · How can you lend a hand this week to a neighbor who's nearby?



MAKE THE CONNECTION

Say: There are many ways we can use our hands to help. We can pray (fold your hands), we can lift (lift your hands), or we can do something easy—like making people feel better (give a thumbsup or pat a child on the back). We serve people with our hands, and we serve everyone because God wants us to.



When asking kids to cut out their traced hands, encourage them to simply cut a circle around the shape, instead of cutting around individual fingers. To save on time, have a few adult volunteers equipped with scissors to help cut out traced hands as well.





Living Inside Out

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Object Lesson

YOU'LL NEED

TV or VPU • DVD player • Large-Group DVD • paper • crayons

I See You



CREATE

Have kids form pairs. Distribute paper and crayons to each child. Have kids write a large "M" and "E" on one side of the paper and the letters "I," "C," and "U" on the reverse.



LOOK

Have partners sit facing each other. Have kids hold their papers in front of their faces with the "ME" facing them. Say: What letters do you see? Allow kids to respond. Say: Your paper says "me." Now keep your paper in front of your eyes for a moment. Sometimes "me" is all we can see when someone else needs help.



RE-LOOK

Say: Now let's see what God wants us to see when someone else needs help. Have kids lower their papers a little so they can see over the top. Have them read their partner's paper. What letters do you see now? Allow kids to respond. You see the letters "I-C-U"—Or "I see you!"



TEACH

Have kids raise their papers back in front of their faces, blocking their partner. Ask: What do you see now? Allow kids to respond. Say: When all we see is ourselves, when all we see is "me," we can't see that others need help. Have kids move their papers down again so they can see their partner's paper. What letters do you see now? Allow kids to respond. When we take our eyes off ourselves, we see ways we can help others. We can say, "I-C-U."



DISCUSS IN GROUPS DVD I See You Questions



Cue the question screen for kids to answer each of the following:

- · Tell about a time you saw that someone needed help and you helped.
- What helps you help others?
- What are some ways you can remember to look at your neighbor's needs rather than focusing on yourself?



MAKE THE CONNECTION

Say: There are ways we can help people every day. Sometimes we just don't notice, because we're thinking about ourselves. Looking for ways to help is the first step, and being willing to help is next. ▶ We serve everyone because God wants us to.

To Care or Not to Care

YOU'LL NEED

1 card with a sad face drawn on it for every 2 children • 1 bandage per child

1. HAND OUT

Give each child either a card with a sad face or a bandage. Tell the children with bandages to be ready to stick a bandage on someone who's hurt. Tell the kids with the sad-face cards to be ready to pretend to be hurt.



Allow 10 minutes



Have children sit in a wide circle. Tell the children with the sad-face cards to lie on the floor in the middle of the circle and pretend they're hurt. Say: Make some noises like you're hurt! Kids with bandages...do you remember what to do? They need help! Have kids with bandages get up one at a time to help by putting bandages on the "hurt" kids and helping them back to a spot in the circle. Then have kids switch roles and repeat the activity.





- Tell about a time you helped someone who was hurt.
- · Why do you think God wants us to help each other?

4. MAKE THE CONNECTION

Say: ► We serve everyone because God wants us to, and one way we can serve people is to help them when they're hurt. Whenever someone needs our help, we'll be there!

Memory Maker

Allow 10 minutes

YOU'LL NEED Bible Memory Makers® • plastic sandwich bags • 5 bandages per child

1. AIDING

Give kids each a Bible Memory Maker Helping Hand. Say: Our Key Verse from Deuteronomy 13:4 is on the Helping Hand. Let's say it together: "Serve only the Lord your God" (Deuteronomy 13:4). Now let's use our Helping Hands to make something that will serve people—a first-aid kit!



2. GRAB

Form pairs. Set out sandwich bags and bandages. Encourage one child in each pair to use the Helping Hand to pick up bandages and place them in the plastic bag while the partner holds open the sandwich bag. Help children count out five bandages for the bag and then switch roles. Have kids seal their bags after the second partner has counted out five bandages.

3. DISCUSS

- In what ways can you use your first-aid kit to help someone?
- You get to take your Helping Hand home this week. What are some ways to use your Helping Hand to help others at home?

4. MAKE THE CONNECTION

Say: We serve God by helping other people. This first-aid kit will definitely help someone—especially if the person has a cut. By helping others, we serve God. Let' say our Key Verse once more: "Serve only the Lord your God" (Deuteronomy 13:4).

5. SEND HOME

Let children take home their Helping Hands.

Who's My Neighbor?

1. FORM A CIRCLE

Say: We serve everyone because God wants us to. He doesn't want us to walk away from people who need help. Have kids form a circle, standing shoulder to shoulder. Say: Look at the people on both sides of you. Who are your neighbors? Shake hands, tell them your name, and say "hi." Allow time.



Now form two equal lines, facing each other. Say: Look at the people across from you. Now who are your neighbors? Shake hands, tell them your name, and say "hi." Allow time.



Form a new circle, and have kids stand shoulder to shoulder. Say: Look at the people across the circle. Now who is your neighbor? Shake hands, tell them your name, and say "hi." Allow time.

4. DISCUSS

- What surprised you about who your neighbors were in this experience?
- · How would you describe a neighbor?
- If everyone's your neighbor, how does that change the way you help people you don't know all that well?

5. MAKE THE CONNECTION

Say: Our neighbors may be nearby or far away. The man that the good Samaritan helped wasn't even from the same town. The good Samaritan helped him because he knew that ▶we serve everyone because God wants us to.

Memory Maker



YOU'LL NEED Bible Memory Makers® • 5 small, lightweight objects • 5 large, heavy objects

1. EXPLAIN

Give everyone a Bible Memory Maker Helping Hand. Say: Let's say our Key Verse from Deuteronomy 13:4: "Serve only the Lord your God" (Deuteronomy 13:4). Let's play a game that helps us understand that we can't serve God and something or someone else at the same time.



2. PICK UP

Place your five small, lightweight objects (such as a piece of paper, a paper clip, a rolled-up piece of foil, a twig, and a tissue) on a table. Set the five large, heavy objects (such as a chair, a big book, a 5 lb. weight, a full soda can, and a ream of paper) near the lightweight objects. Have kids each use only a Helping Hand to pick up one of the light objects. When they have it in the hand, have them each try to pick up one of the heavy objects at the same time without dropping the light object.

3 DISCUSS

- · What happened when you tried to pick up two objects at once?
- How is trying to serve God and something or someone else like trying to grab two objects at once?
- · How can you stay focused on serving only God?

4. MAKE THE CONNECTION

Say: When you www. "serve only the Lord your God," he'll lead you to neighbors he wants you to help. But if you're distracted by other things, it's harder to see what God wants you to do to help others.

5. SEND HOME

Let children take home their Helping Hands.

- SHARE

Say: The good Samaritan didn't let differences stop him from helping someone. Talk to a partner and together find out something you have in common and something that's different about each of you. Allow time.

◆ The Point ▶

We serve everyone because God wants us to.



Key Verse

"Serve only the Lord your God and fear him alone. Obey his commands, listen to his voice, and cling to him." -Deuteronomy 13:4

Pass the Paper

YOU'LL NEED

10 strips of paper • tape • pencils

1. SPREAD

Place the untaped strips of paper on a flat surface.

2. CHALLENGE

Give each child a pencil. Challenge kids to try to pick up the strips of paper using just their pencils.

3. CONTINUE

Place the taped strips of paper near the flat paper, and have kids try to pick them up with their pencils.

4. DISCUSS

- How did the differences in the papers make them easier or harder to pick up?
- · What can make people in your life hard to handle or difficult
- · Rather than ignoring people you don't like or giving up on people who are difficult, how can you respond to them the way the good Samaritan did?

5. MAKE THE CONNECTION

Say: Just like the two types of paper strips were different, people are all different, too. Sometimes serving others can be hard—the way trying to pick up flat paper with a pencil was. Sometimes serving others is easier—the way picking up the "O"-shaped paper was. When people are open and willing to accept help, it's easier to help them. But ▶we serve everyone because God wants us to—not because it's easy.

YOU'LL NEED Bibles • Bible Memory Makers® • small, individually wrapped candies in a bowl

1. DISTRIBUTE

Give everyone a Bible Memory Maker Helping Hand, and say: Part of our Key Verse is on the Helping Hand. Let's look up the entire verse in Deuteronomy 13:4 and read it together: (**) "Serve only the Lord your God and fear him alone. Obey his commands, listen to his voice, and cling to him" (Deuteronomy 13:4).



Set out the bowl of candy, and have kids take turns each using their Helping Hand to pick up and serve a candy to *only* the kids with an "A" in their name. Give them each 10 seconds to do this. Play several times with different instructions, such as serving only kids wearing red, only kids with shoes with laces, only kids with socks, and so on.



- Talk about what it was like to serve only certain people.
- · What was it like to not be served if you didn't fit in a group?
- · Why do you think God wants us to serve all people?
- How would your life look different this week if you spent it serving other people?

4. MAKE THE CONNECTION

Say: When it comes to serving others, it's not about who's wearing red or whether we like the person or not. We don't serve so we get a pat on the back or a good feeling about ourselves for doing something nice. ► We serve everyone because God wants us to.

5. SEND HOME

Let kids take home their Helping Hands.

CHALLENGE 3

Talk to the teachers at your church, and offer to be a good Samaritan by sending postcards or notes to kids who are sick, new, or haven't been in church lately.
